Introduction

The Experience of a "Military Brat"...

Transition:

A lot of us have had experiences with people in positions of authority that make our relationship with the concept of authority a difficult one. Add to that our flesh that has a bent to not want to yield to one in authority. So, we will have to try to set aside our negative experiences and emotional sense of things when we look at today's essential element: The Authority of the Bible.

I. A Working Definition:

"Authoritative words are words that impose obligations on the lives of their readers and hearers. To say that the Bible is authoritative is to say that it governs all areas of human life."

God is by nature the supreme authority in the universe, governing the lives of all his creatures. When he speaks, creatures must obey or bear the consequences of disobedience. The Bible is his word, and therefore human beings must obey all aspects of it in every area of their lives. ...

The Westminster Confession of Faith, 14.2, says that by saving faith, "a Christian believes to be true whatever is revealed in the Word, for the authority of God himself speaking therein; and acts differently upon that which every particular passage [contains]; yielding obedience to the commands, trembling at the threatenings, and embracing the promises of God for this life, and that which is to come."

This is not to say that the content of Scripture [is measured by] human standards of what is right and wrong, true and false. Rather, Scripture is itself the very standard, the ultimate criterion of what is true and right.

Nor should we restrict the authority of Scripture to some narrow sphere of human life, such as religion or worship. Scripture governs the religious life, but before God all of life is religion in the sense that we are to do everything to the glory of God. Scripture is the supreme guide as to how to glorify God in all of life.

So however difficult it may be in a social environment, the Christian must be bold to obey the Bible, not only in church, but in the workplace, in intellectual life, in science, philosophy, law, politics, the arts, culture, commerce, and entertainment.

Believers must, of course, respect the fact that Scripture focuses on redemption rather than general culture. But that redemption itself is cosmic: the removal of the fall's curse from all creation and the reconciliation of all things to God. The Bible's authority extends over all areas of human life.


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Purpose: To care for and serve those under them.	Purpose is perverted to serve oneself at the expense of those under them.

IV. Understanding the Aspects of Authority in Eph. 1

- A. Authority of Position- [Gr. EXOUSIA] "one has the RIGHT to speak or act."
- B. Authority of Function [Gr. DUNAMIS] "one has the POWER to speak or act."
 - 1. Strength [Gr. KRATOS] "power to control"
 - 2. Might [Gr. ISCHUS] "exceptional capability"
 - 3. Dominion [Gr. KURIOTES] "power to govern"
- C. Authority of Person "one has the moral power by virtue of exemplary character and conduct to draw and influence others to willingly obey, follow, and sacrifice."

V. Jesus, "The Word," and His Authority

- A. Luke 4
 - 1. Nazareth vv. 14-30, his closest friends and family didn't believe and obey
 - 2. Capernaum vv. 31-41, the demons obey
 - v. 32, "His message was with authority"
 - v. 36, "for with authority power he commands the unclean spirits"
 - v. 41, "He would not allow them (demons) to speak."
- B. Luke 8: 22-25, Jesus Asleep in the Storm,—the wind and the waves obey

V. Jesus, "The Word," and His Authority

- C. Luke 7: The Centurion with Great Faith, vv. 1-9—a pagan outsider believes; He understands the authority to direct and bind. (see Matt. 18:18).
- D. Matt. 28: 18-20, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth...MAKE DISCIPLES!"
