An Object for Demonstration *Egypt *Canaan *Nineveh

Egypt-A Demonstration of Power and a Promise Kept

God chose to use the plagues so there was no question that He was greater than Pharaoh or anything else ones choose to worship.

God chose to demonstrate His power when Pharaoh would not bend his will to God's Will so that God could keep His own promises.

Canaan-A Demonstration of God's Patience, Judgement, and Faithfulness to His Promises.

Canaanite culture was morally disgusting. (Deut 9:5; Lev 18:24-25; Deut 18:9,12)

Their idolatrous system and culture had been evil for over 400 years (Gen 15:14-16) Think of time leading up to Sodom (Abram and Lot) through Isaac, Jacob, on into Moses and Joshua.

Nineveh-A Demonstration of Mercy

God sovereignly chose to be merciful to Nineveh:

*Mercifully sent Jonah (rebellious and unwilling) to warn the city.

*People and King repented and God mercifully chose not to destroy them. (verses in notes)

"Who knows, God may turn and relent and withdraw His burning anger so that we will not perish."

Jonah 3:9

"...You are a gracious and compassionate God, slow to anger and abundant in lovingkindness and One who relents concerning calamity..."

A Tool for Implementation *Nebuchadnezzar *Cyrus *Pilate

Nebuchadnezzar-Tool of God's Judgement

God had warned of the destruction that would follow if the Hebrew people ignored God's plan and followed other nations' ways.

Cyrus-Tool of God's Restoration

God chooses Cyrus to return the Jewish people to Jerusalem.

God says, "It is I who says of Cyrus, '*He* is my shepherd! And he will perform all My desire.' And He declares of Jerusalem, 'She will be built,' And of the temple, 'Your foundation will be laid.'" Isaiah 44:28

Pilate-Tool of God's Redemption

While Jewish religious leaders did have some authority under Roman rule, they did not have authority to put anyone to death. (John 18: 28-32)

Pilate's authority came from God himself. Jesus said, "You would have no authority over Me unless it had been given to you from above..." John 19:11
